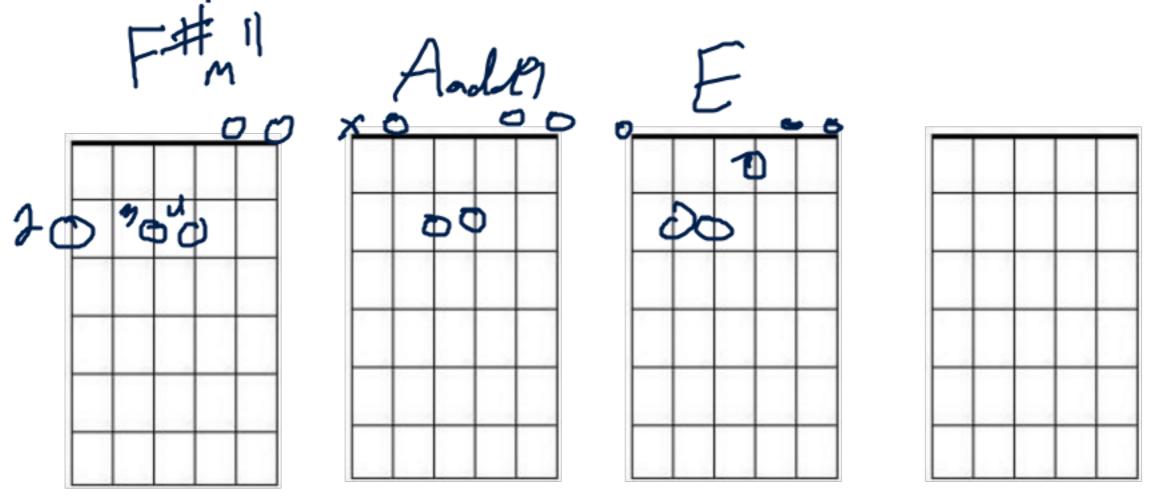

#### Steps for Learning New Songs

- 1. Listen to the original or most popular version. There may be one or more popular recordings. Try to find out which one your client is most familiar with.
- Learn basic vocal melody and harmonic accompaniment.
   If you need to, learn these separately before putting them together.
- 3. Listen to the drums and underlying rhythmic patterns.
  What beats are accented?
- 4. Play along with the recording for practice, if possible.

- Transpose to an appropriate key if necessary.
- 6. Practice song in a couple different styles. For example, how would you play it if you were trying to help your client relax? How would you play it if you were facilitating a group singing intervention for a large group?
- 7. Explore opportunities for harmonic or melodic embellishment.

Example 1: Shake It Off



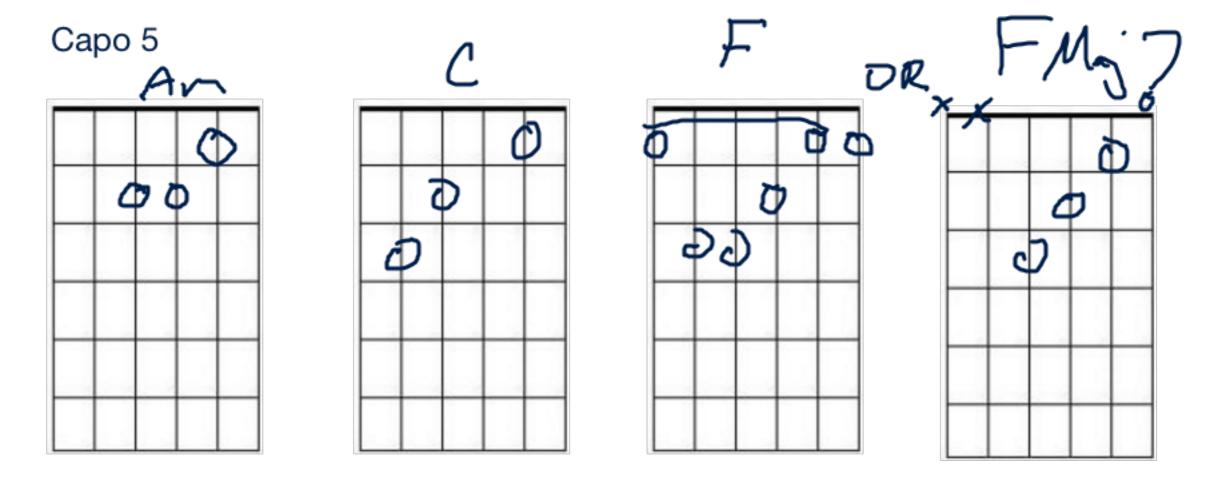

Key: F

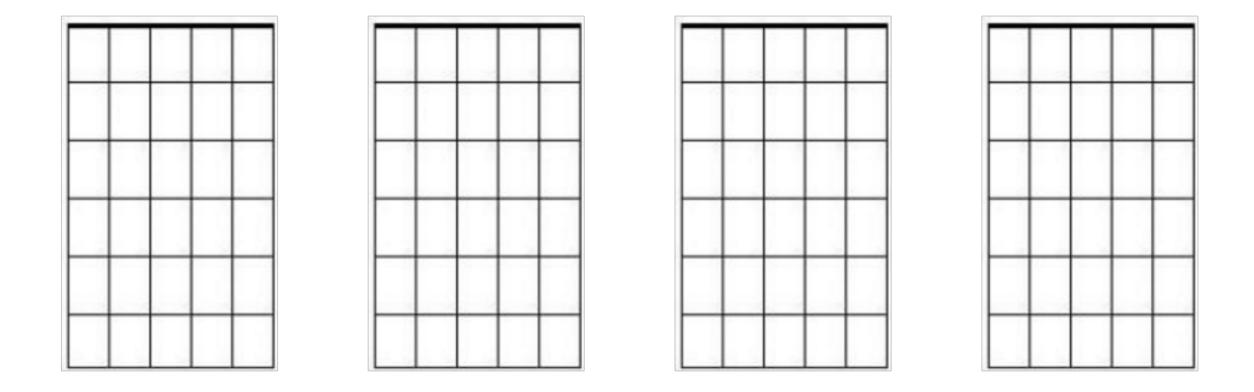
Chords:
